A confidence man who sought to revenge the man who conned his parents.




John Locke

Lost is an American television series created by Jeffrey Lieber, J. J. Abrams and Damon Lindelof, which originally aired on the American Broadcasting Company (ABC) from September 22, 2004 to May 23, 2010. The series follows the lives of various individuals and groups of people, most importantly the survivors of the crash of a commercial passenger jet flying between Sydney and Los Angeles, on a mysterious tropical island somewhere in the South Pacific Ocean. Episodes typically feature a primary storyline on the island, as well as a secondary storyline from another point in a character's life.

Jean Higgins started as a producer on the first season, continuing through the entire series to end as an executive producer. Due to its large ensemble cast and the cost of filming primarily on location in Oahu, Hawaii, the series was one of the most expensive on television. During its run, the series utilized online alternate reality games and references to the series appear in print, film, other television programs and Web media.

A critically-acclaimed and popular success, Lost was consistently ranked by US critics on their lists of top two series of all time. The first season garnered an average of 15.69 million US viewers per episode on ABC. During its sixth and final season, the show averaged over 11 million US viewers per episode. Lost was the recipient of hundreds of US award nominations throughout its run, and won numerous industry awards, including the Emmy Award for US primetime Outstanding Drama Series in 2005, Best American Import at the British Academy Television Awards

DO YOU KNOW? LOST TRIVIA FACTS



Fact #1
The Oceanic airplane is supposed to be a Boeing 777, but when you see Jack running through the wreckage you can see that the main landing gear of the plane has only 4 wheels instead of the six a B-777 would have.

FACT #2
The production budget for the two-hour pilot was \$11.5 million, making it the most expensive pilot in TV history and far greater than the cost of most television shows.

In the first draft of the pilot, the episode would have covered six weeks of the story. Originally, the first episode would have ended with all the survivors already living in tents.

Olivia Dunham

An FBI special agent who was recruited by Philip Broyles to be part of the Fringe Division of the FBI.



Peter Bishop

A jack-of-all-trades who is brought in as a civilian consultant by Olivia to work with his father, Walter.



William Bell

The former lab partner of Walter Bishop and the founder of Massive Dynamic.



Sam Weiss

Bowling alley owner who became involved with the Fringe Division by counseling Olivia Dunham.



Walter Bishop

A researcher specializing in fringe science, recruited by the FBI to work in their Fringe Division.



Charlie Francis

An FBI agent, close friend and confidant of Olivia Dunham.



Walternate

Nickname given by Walter Bishop to the Alternate Universe version of himself.





Fringe follows the casework of the Fringe Division, a Joint Federal Task Force supported primarily by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which includes Agent Olivia Dunham; Doctor Walter Bishop, the archetypal mad scientist; and Peter Bishop, Walter's estranged son and jack-of-all-trades. The Fringe Division investigates cases relating to fringe science, ranging from transhumanist experiments gone wrong to the prospect of a destructive technological singularity to a possible collision of two parallel universes. The Fringe Division's work often intersects with advanced biotechnology developed by a company called Massive Dynamic, founded by Walter's former partner, Doctor William Bell. The team is also watched silently by a group of men who call themselves "Observers".

for Fringe came from a range of sources, including the writings of Michael Crichton, the Ken Russell film *Altered States*, and the television series *The X-Files* and *The Twilight Zone*. Additionally, Orci stated that it is a combination of a procedural and an "extremely serialized and very culty" series, quoting as examples of each, *Law & Order* and *Lost*.



What Are The Fringe Glyphs? The Fringe Glyphs appear on screen before commercial breaks. Each glyph serves as a visual clue (letter) and forms a word that describes the episode.

Jeff Pinkner was selected to act as the head show runner and executive producer. Abrams noted that he trusts Pinkner after working together with him on *Alias* and *Lost*. In season two, J.H. Wyman was brought on as executive producer and showrunner with Michael Giacchino, Abrams' frequent collaborator, composed the music for the pilot of *Fringe*, before handing over duties to his assistants Chad Seiter and Chris Tilton; Giacchino retains an on-screen credit. Abrams himself wrote the series theme music. The two-hour pilot episode, filmed in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, cost a total of \$10 million to create.

DID YOU KNOW? FRINGE TRIVIA FACTS

Fact #1
